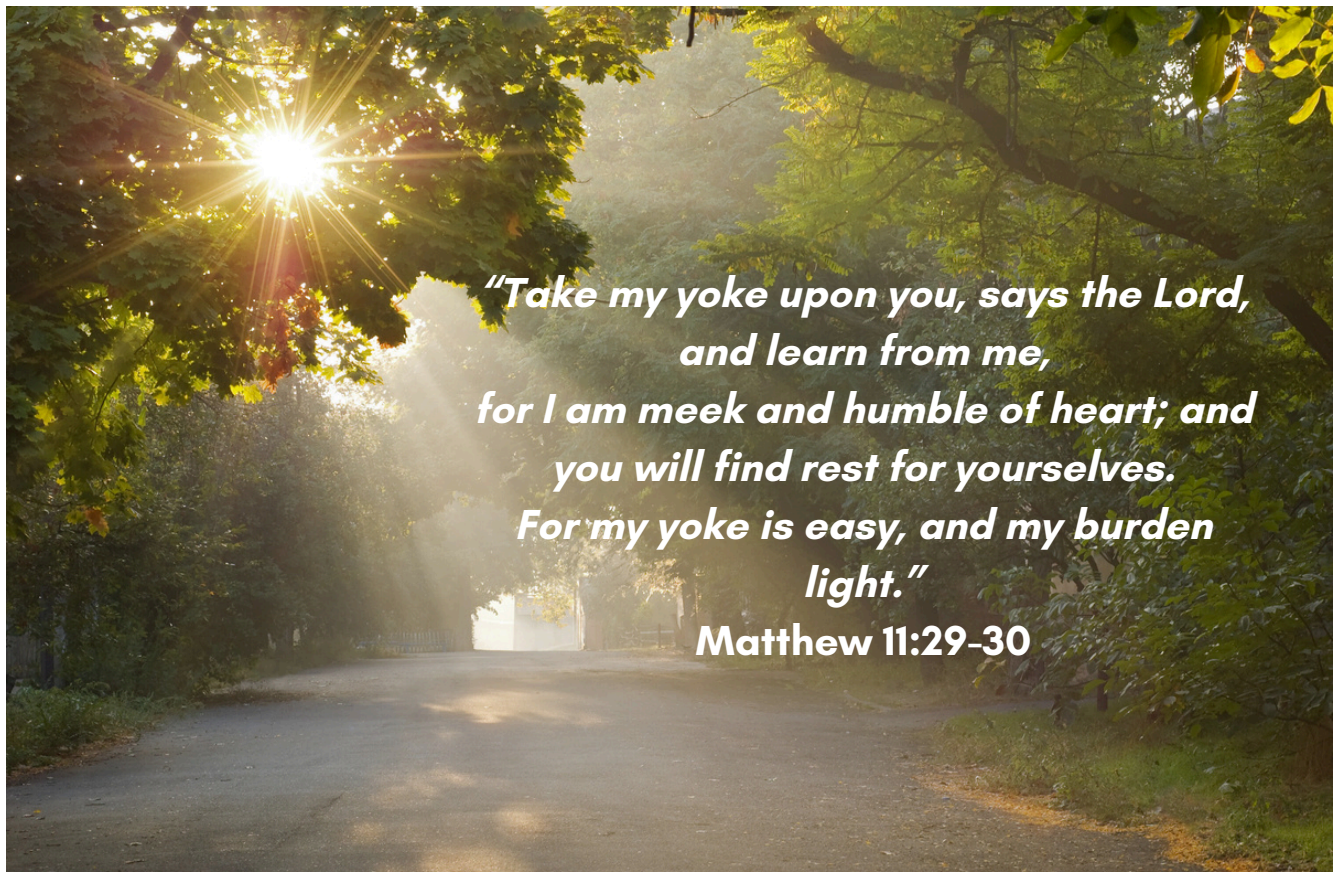

Happy 50th Anniversary to our incredible organization! This milestone is a testament to the hard work, dedication and shared vision of the women in the diocese of Orange. For nearly 50 years we have worked diligently to promote among the Catholic Women in our diocese a greater devotion to Christ and the Church, sharing the Blessed Mother's role of bringing others to Christ through Spirituality, Leadership and Service.

The first thing we did 50 years ago was pray! We prayed for our new Bishop, new Diocese and new Women's Council. These prayers began as soon as we heard that a new diocese was being established.

Our first call to service was from our new bishop, Bishop William Johnson. He asked us to host his reception for the laity on June 20, 1976. Our council ladies found a suitable location, the Sisters of St. Joseph convent lobby, and supplied sandwiches and cookies for approximately 2,500 people! First Council President, Diane Abati, stood with Bishop Johnson shaking hands with visitors for four hours. Bishop Johnson encouraged and supported our council until his death in 1986.

Over the years, our council has been busy building women up through our general meetings, conferences and retreats; supporting our community through service to life centers and food centers; participation in legislative advocacy; working against human trafficking, and much more.

As part of our year long celebration of our council this year, we will share a photo slide show focusing on a different decade at each of our monthly meetings. August 10, 1936 - July 23, 2025



Jacqueline "Jackie" Dolores Brandon died peacefully in her sleep at the age of 88 in Portland, Oregon. Jackie moved to Portland in January 2024 when she realized the need to downsize from her house in Yorba Linda, CA where she had lived for over 40 years. Her commitment to her faith was undying and it was exemplified in how she showed up every single day. When Jackie moved to Yorba Linda with her husband Eddie, she quickly embraced the parish at St. Martin de Porres Church, engaging in everything from serving as a Eucharistic minister, inaugurating the Senior Citizens group, working at the annual Oktoberfest, and participating in WINGS among many other activities. She volunteered her time to the Catholic community far beyond her

church, including serving on boards for the Orange County Diocesan Council of Catholic Women, twice as ODCCW President, and the National Council of Catholic Women, twice as Province Director.

Jackie's faith extended far beyond her church activities. She was called to nurture and support everyone around her in any way that she could. She was a welcomed and guiding light for everyone she touched whether it was as a daughter, sister, wife, mother, grandmother, great-grandmother, aunt, friend, neighbor, fellow parishioner, or myriad volunteer roles (both in and out of the church). She was fiercely loyal to all of her loved ones and fostered many, many lifelong friendships around the world and over the course of her life.

Her bright and shining eyes were irresistible, her easy smile was both beautiful and infectious, and her strong, yet humble presence could lift any room the moment she entered. Her accomplishments are far too many to name. But here a few things we can never forget: the award winning costumes she made for her children and grandchildren; her heirloom quality Christmas tree skirts; her festive widow's holiday party; her special recipes, including apricot chicken, hot seafood dip, shrimp and corn chowder, and the holiday chantilly cream; the countless cards we all received for birthday, special occasions, and holidays; her extraordinary collection of angels; and her perpetual holiday tree. Jackie leaves a huge gap in the lives of many and we are all better people for having been a part of her life.

National Purple Heart Day is celebrated on August 7 and was established by President Donald J. Trump in 2025. The same day that George Washington gave the first one on August 7, 1782 and was originally known as the Badge of Military Merit.



International Left Handers Day is an international day observed annually on August 13 to celebrate the uniqueness and differences of left-handed individuals. The day was first observed in 1976 by Dean R. Campbell, founder of the Left-handers Club.



National Aviation Day is celebrated on Tuesday, August 19 honoring the development of aviation. However, in 1939, President Franklin Delano Roosevelt proclaimed it in honor Orville Wright's birthday.



Augustus for August: After Julius's grandnephew Augustus defeated Marc Antony and Cleopatra, and became emperor of Rome, the Roman Senate decided that he too should have a month named after him. The month *Sextillis* (sex = six) was chosen for Augustus, and the senate justified its actions in the following resolution: Whereas the Emperor Augustus Caesar, in the month of Sextillis . . . thrice entered the city in triumph . . . and in the same month Egypt was brought under the authority of the Roman people, and in the same month an end was put to the civil wars; and whereas for these reasons the said month is, and has been, most fortunate to this empire, it is hereby decreed by the senate that the said month shall be called Augustus.

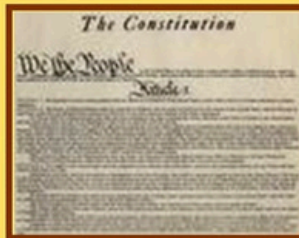

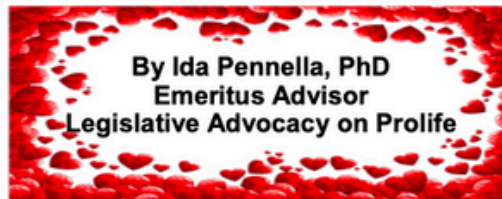
Selective Service Act of 1940

New Poll Shows Gains in Pro-Life Sentiment

On Thursday, the Associated Press and the NORC Center for Public Affairs Research released the results of a poll of over 1,400 adults in mid-July. The findings contain good news for pro-lifers.

The results indicate that the percentage of adults who think abortion should be illegal in "all cases" or "most cases" increased by seven percentage points since June 2024. Overall, this AP/NORC poll reports the highest level of pro-life sentiment since the leak of the *Dobbs* decision in May 2022.

Congressman Celebrates End of Biden Era Policy That Killed Babies in Abortions

Washington, DC - Congressman Chris Smith, R-N.J., co-chair of the House Pro-Life Caucus, publicly welcomed the Department of Veterans Affairs' (VA) decision to reverse a Biden-era regulation that had allowed taxpayer-funded abortions at VA hospitals.

In a statement issued Aug. 1, Smith commended President Trump and VA Secretary Doug Collins for what he called a restoration of "humane" and lawful standards.

"In reversing the Biden Administration's VA abortion policy," Smith said, "President Trump and Secretary Collins both honor the will of the American people, who do not support their taxpayer dollars paying for abortions, and affirm that VA healthcare facilities are places to heal, not violently end the lives of unborn children through the grisly act of abortion." House Passes Bill Reversing Biden Policy Turning VA Clinics Into Abortion Centers

Washington, DC - Today the House passed Republicans' 2026 Military Construction, Veterans Affairs, and Related Agencies funding bill that reverses a pro-abortion policy Joe Biden implemented that turned VA clinics into abortion centers.

Federal law authorizes the VA to provide certain health services to women veterans **but explicitly excludes abortion**. Federal regulation previously complied with the law and prohibited VA from killing babies in abortions and abortion counseling in its medical benefits package. "Hunger is real for 1 in 5 of your neighbors! Take action to do something about it."

Are you 'hungry' for God? September is "Hungry Action Month". When we hunger for God, we can serve Him by easing the human hunger of others.

How are you called to serve God? Feeding the hungry, one of the Corporal Works of Mercy as seen in Matthew 25:31-46. It is a good way to get started serving God and His people. Does your parish have a food program or food bank? If not, consider partnering with St. Vincent De Paul, or Second Harvest.

Here are some ways to feed the hungry, according to the website, <http://feedoc.org>, the Second Harvest Food Bank of Orange County, Society of St. Vincent De Paul, is a member of Feeding America, and stated that *September is hunger action month. Second Harvest provides food to Catholic and non-Catholic centers on designated days and times.

Perhaps you could organize an on-going program at your parish. Plan a food drive or establish a distribution center at your church. One of the parishes that I occasionally attend for Mass, Beatitudes of Our Lord, has such a program called, Good Sam's Pantry. A basket is placed in the foyer of the church with a list of preferred food for people to donate on a daily basis. Every Thursday, for one hour, the poor of the community go to the hall where dedicated servers have bagged the food for distribution. This parish program is not assisted by St. Vincent De Paul or any other agency.

Are you ready to make a difference and serve God through feeding the hungry? Make a commitment during the month of September and do something.
