As a little girl raised in the 40s and 50s, fond memories fill my mind as I think back to a time growing up in a French-Canadian community in Manchester, NH. We lived four houses from my Mémère and Peper's house. Since St. Patrick's church and school was across the street from them, I walked to school.



The start of Advent was an anticipated event at Mémère house, because after dinner, the youngest child in the family, me, lit the simple wreath, just four candles on a makeshift stand with some evergreen branches. This was a time to show Jesus we loved Him. Similar to Lent, the kids gave up candy.

Christmas Eve was the big event, Jesus was born! As I looked out the window, bundled in my snowsuit, getting ready to walk to Midnight Mass, I exclaimed, "Mommy, it's snowing". Everyone was excited.

After Mass, we walked back to Mémère's house, and as we entered the parlor, I was excited to see the Christmas tree aglow with flickering bubble-lights. Santa had delivered the gifts while we were at church, and baby Jesus was laying in the manger. From the kitchen the aroma of freshly baked tourtière\* with cinnamon and cloves was ready to eat at 1:30 AM.

As we reflect today on this Holy Season of Advent, it doesn't end until December 24. With that in mind, there's still time to prepare for the birth of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Let us consider the scriptures and practical applications of being Jesus' hands and feet to others.

Consider doing the **Corporal Works of Mercy** during Advent.  
They provide for the needs of the body.

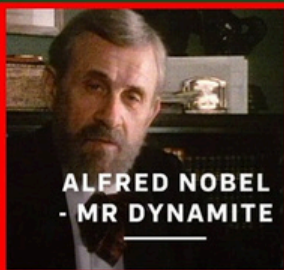

## BREAKING NEWS



Susan B. Anthony Pro-Life America (SBA Pro-Life America), SBA Pro-Life America and its affiliated super PAC (Women Speak Out PAC) plan to spend \$80 million to elect anti-abortion candidates in the 2026 midterm elections.

**Goal:** Retain pro-life majorities in the U.S. House and Senate.

**Target Audience:** The campaign will target 10.5 million pro-life voters through canvassing, digital advertising, and voter contact mail.

**Key Battleground States:** The effort will focus on states including Iowa, Georgia, Michigan, and North Carolina, which feature key Senate and House races.

**Methods:** The plan includes 4.5 million home visits and deploying student volunteer teams to competitive House districts.

### Arkansas Named Most Pro-Life State in America for Sixth Year in a Row Newsroom Oct 27, 2025

**LITTLE ROCK, Ark.** – On Monday, Governor



Sarah Huckabee Sanders joined Americans United for Life and the Arkansas Family Council to announce that Arkansas ranked the most pro-life state in America for the sixth year in a row, according to annual rankings released by Americans United for Life. The pro-life organization ranks all 50 states based on state laws that protect the unborn, the elderly, the disabled, and the terminally ill.

“Pro-life is whole life, and I’m proud that for the past six years, Arkansas has ranked number one in the nation – not just in protecting the unborn, but in preserving life from conception to natural conclusion,” **said Governor Sanders**. “I’m thankful to the activists who have fought for this day for decades and promise that as governor, I will continue to fight every day to protect the most vulnerable among us.”

“Today, Americans United for Life recognized the many pro-life laws and policies our state has enacted over the years. Arkansans should be proud of their state legislators for passing the best laws in the nation when it comes to protecting unborn children, the elderly, the disabled, and the terminally ill.

That’s something to celebrate,” **said Arkansas Family Council President Jerry Cox**. Since the 1973 Roe v. Wade decision, Arkansas has passed more than 65 laws to protect the dignity of human life, including prohibiting abortion except to save the mother’s life in 2021 – a law that became effective when the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe through the Dobbs v. Jackson Women’s Health Center decision in 2022.

**NOTE:** The NCCW Legislative Advocacy Committee is under the Spirituality Commission and is guided by Catholic Social Teaching for legislation on: 1) **Abortion:** opposes abortion and infanticide, includes ProLife issues, 2) **Human rights:** Includes human dignity, domestic violence, human trafficking and opposition to genocide, 3) **Women’s health:** screening for osteoporosis and routine health care, and 4) **Equal opportunities:** minimum wage, social security, and health insurance.



## POPE LEO XIV ON SUICIDE PREVENTION

### **POPE'S PRAYER INTENTION FOR NOVEMBER: SUICIDE PREVENTION**

Following Shayla Patron's talk on Suicide Prevention on November 18, I found it interesting to view several articles on Pope Leo XIV dedicating his November 2025 monthly prayer intention to the prevention of suicide. One of the articles was by Deborah Castellano Lubov of the Vatican News and another generated on the web by AI.

The Pope called "for prayer, community support, and the use of professional mental health resources for those struggling with suicidal thoughts ... [and] for communities to offer support, care, and love to those struggling with suicidal thoughts."

He stressed the "importance of professional help", and stated that "the Church does not replace healthcare professionals and encouraged seeking necessary professional help, such as from psychologists, doctors, and therapists" and that "the general practice of the Church today is to treat those who have died by suicide very respectfully, acknowledging the role of mental health issues and the complexities involved."

His core message "is the need for people to rediscover that life is a gift and that meaning and beauty can persist even amidst pain and suffering" and concluded, "that all people, including believers, are vulnerable to sadness and hopelessness."
